

**present perfect** I've met Bill twice. simple past tense We met in 1999 and in 2004.

#### The present perfect or the simple past tense? Complete these grammar rules.

1. Use <u>Simple Past</u> to talk about a definite or specific time in the past. (We know when.)

2. Use <u>**Present Perfect**</u> to talk about an indefinite time in the past. (We don't know when.)





#### Look at these examples of the present perfect.

We've met them. Have you met them? Has she called him? We **haven't met** them. Yes, we **have**. / No, we **haven't**. Yes, she **has**. / No, she **hasn't**.
